
Dear Mayor Milo,

I am proud to submit this Annual Report which reflects the activities of the LaPorte City Police Department for the calendar year of 2013. This report includes information about the activities the various divisions of our department have undertaken in 2013 as well as the community outreach activities that our department has engaged in. We have set forth a number of goals and objectives for 2014 that we feel will continue to increase our presence in the community and reduce crimes in our city. We look forward to working with both the City Administration and the Community as our partners in achieving these goals for 2014 and beyond.

We are extremely excited by the fact that while our calls for service were up over 5% on the year the overall offenses dropped by 18.93%! I feel that this is in large part to the extra effort our officers have given towards Community Policing and Public Relations. We went from 156 Community Policing contacts in 2011, to 3558 in 2012 and came in with 6056 for 2013. Our Bank Call contacts went from 336 in 2011, to 643 in 2012, to 1362 in 2013. We also instituted our Coffee with a Cop Program and had our first Virtual Ride Along experience. I truly believe that these efforts, made by every officer on this department, have greatly contributed to the 18.93% decrease in criminal offenses. This is great news for the City of LaPorte and the people we are tasked with protecting and serving.

We are also aggressively continuing our fight against the drug issues facing this city and continue to explore every option possible in this battle. Our department had quite a few high profile cases this year and I am pleased to report that our Officers and Detectives have done a fantastic job in handling and solving these cases. I am very happy to report that 2013 was a very successful year for the LaPorte City Police Department and I expect even more success in 2014!

2013 Annual Report Executive Summary

Department Organization and Information

Value Statement

Since its formation in 1910, the La Porte Police Department has been providing efficient, cost effective full service law enforcement to the citizens of and visitors to La Porte, Indiana in a manner that is responsive to the ever-changing needs of the community.

Merit Board

The Merit Board is charged with the responsibility of hiring, promotion and discipline of all sworn officers employed the department. The Merit Board is made of three citizens of the City of La Porte. One member is appointed by the mayor, one member is appointed by the city council and one member is elected by the officers of the department.

Administration

The La Porte Police Department is headed by Chief of Police Adam Klimczak who took over leadership of the department on January 1, 2012. The Chief is assisted by Assistant Chief Julie Smith who is charged with many of the day to day duties of running the department. A Community Policing Coordinator, Corporal Karl Jackson assists the administration with community policing and community outreach programs.

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division consists of 31 uniformed officers and is divided into three shifts. Each shift is led by three to four supervisors that include a Captain, at least one Sergeant and at least one Corporal. The shift supervision is responsible for the day to day supervision of the shift. Patrol Division duties consist of responding to all calls for service; enforcing all criminal and traffic laws and municipal ordinances, investigating traffic crashes and conducting investigations involving misdemeanor and lower level felony cases.

Detective Bureau

The Detective Bureau consists of eight plainclothes officers led by a Captain, a Sergeant and a Corporal. The Detective Bureau leadership is responsible for the day to day operation of the Detective Bureau such as assigning cases and supervising investigators. The Detective Bureau is charged with conducting investigations of a more serious or complex nature consisting primarily of felony crimes. Two of the detectives are assigned to the La Porte County Metro Operations Task Force.

Records Division

The Records Division is responsible for the maintenance of all records regarding case reports, traffic crash reports and criminal and traffic arrests. The Records Division personnel also process records requests, handgun permits and criminal history checks and take fingerprints for employment purposes.

Information Technology Division

The La Porte police department is highly computerized and very dependent on information technology for all day to day tasks. The La Porte Police Department has one network administrator, Charles Smith, who is responsible for maintaining everything listed below.

- Maintains 12 servers and 44 work stations.
- Maintains 51 laptops, 44 of which are used as Mobile Data Terminals.
- Maintains network connections to the La Porte County Emergency 911 Communications Center and the La Porte County Sheriff's Office and a separate full time connection to IDACS.
- Oversees two radio base stations as 44 portable and 45 mobile radios.
- Maintains all FCC licensing for radios.
- Maintains and oversees seven printers.
- Creates and maintains all department forms and databases.
- Maintains all stock on radio, computer and printer supplies.
- Oversees and assists 50+ users.
- Acts as a CISCO Administrator.
- Acts as a communications liaison with three other agencies.
- Works with the State of Indiana on implementing and configuring all state required programs and forms.
- Maintains records of all software licensing and computer equipment documentation.

Use of Federal Grant Funding

- The La Porte Police participates in the Bulletproof Vest Partnership program and receives one half of the cost of all ballistic vests purchased for officers. This creates a substantial savings for our department, particularly in years when a lot of vests are needed. The amount of reimbursement received from the federal government in 2013 was \$840.95.
- In 2009, the La Porte Police Department applied for and received a grant through the COPS Hiring Rehiring Program that funded two officers. Funding for one of the positions has since expired, but the other position will be funded June of 2014. During 2013, the revenue received through this grant was \$66,015.22.
- The La Porte Police Department continued its partnership in the fight against impaired driving with the La Porte County DUI Taskforce and \$20,220.59 in grant funding from DUI: Taskforce Indiana.
- The La Porte Police Department continued its participation in the Operation Pull Over grant program. This program targets passenger restraint violations, impaired driving and other

dangerous driving behavior. The department received \$22,500.00 in Operation Pull Over funding in 2013.

Activity Summary and Accomplishments

Data Definitions

The statistics included in both this summary and the actual data portion of this report is based on data numerical data and numerical data contains some inconsistencies and inaccuracies. Everything possible has been done detect any inconsistencies or inaccuracies in the data, however some may still exist. It should be noted that there is some natural fluctuation in data from year to year and this fluctuation is natural and cannot be tied to any specific cause or be used to infer any future trends. Some categories may have wild fluctuations percentage wise; but are based on such small numbers of records that these fluctuations are not really significant. Here are some other things that the reader needs to be aware of when looking at the data.

- Accident data is based on the actual traffic crashes investigated with the exception of the Accidents by Age report that includes all crashes whether they were investigated or not. That is the reason that there is a category for Unknown Age.
- Calls for Service and related reports reflect the calls for service as they were initially called in to the 911 Center and dispatched out to the officers, not what the calls eventually ended up being.
- Offenses and related data may be thought as incidents where a case report was actually done because a crime was committed or to record the incident.
- The DUI: Taskforce Indiana and Operation Pull Over funding is based on the federal fiscal year and reflects money received for activities conducted between October 1, 2012 and September 30, 2013. All other grant money figures are based on the calendar year.

Accomplishments in 2013

Projects Completed

- With the help of the La Porte County Prosecutor's the La Porte Police Department has a new K-9 named Rambo working on Afternoon Shift with Patrol Specialist Drangmeister. Rambo is trained in narcotics detection and search and apprehension.
- The La Porte Police Department has re-instituted the DARE program and is in the process of teaching drug resistance strategies and other life skills to all fifth graders in the La Porte Community School System as well one sixth grade. When DARE training is completed this spring a total of 504 students will have received it.
- Through our Adopt a School program, some of the Patrol Division's officers have "adopted" grade schools that they visit on a regular basis throughout the school year.
- Assistant Chief Julie Smith sends information regarding crime, department activities and community announcements on a regular to 1,145 subscribers via Nixle. Nixle is a free online service which sends out messages via either text or email to persons who subscribe to the

service. We believe this is a very good way for people to keep abreast of what is happening in their community.

- Corporal Karl Jackson has started a Coffee with a Cop program which affords citizens the opportunity to sit down in a restaurant and discuss their concerns and issues with a police officer. Corporal Jackson has plans to hold more Coffee with a Cop programs this year as well.
- The La Porte Police Department also did a Virtual Ride Along program where Detective James Ferguson made posts on Facebook throughout the evening regarding his activities as he was working a shift with the Patrol Division. This program gave people gave our citizens an idea what an officer's normal work day is like.
- Software to track officer training has been implemented in order to ensure that all officers meet their training requirements.
- A concerted ordinance enforcement effort between the police and code enforcement departments was undertaken and resulted in some significant successes.
- The police department continues to share information with the public on Facebook, the police department's web site and the City of La Porte's web site.

Projects that are in Progress in 2014

- Steps are being taken to increase the La Porte Police Department's network security in response to the growing threat of cyber terrorism to government and business computer networks around the globe.
- Fifteen work stations are being replaced in order to enhance network security by bringing our equipment to the current operating system. This is being done to address the issue of support for Windows XP being discontinued on April 1, 2014.
- Thirty-five laptops, which are used in our Patrol Division's squad cars as mobile data terminals, are being replaced to address the issue of support for Windows XP being discontinued on April 1, 2014.
- A new server was put in service in order to consolidate services from multiple older, less efficient servers in order to conserve energy and reduce maintenance costs.
- Our Community Policing Coordinator, Corporal Karl Jackson, surveyed many of the local businesses to determine how the police department may serve them better and address their needs. Corporal Jackson is in the process of compiling the results of those surveys.
- It is expected that the new InterAct CAD/RMS program will finally be a reality, so a substantial amount of training will have to be done for that.

Goals and Objectives for 2014

- To further curb drug trafficking activities in our community which have resulted in our city's issues with addiction and heroin overdose deaths.
- To continue to leverage our community policing activities in an effort to provide a safer community for everyone.
- To keep our department's manpower at full strength in order to have the most resources possible to commit to dealing with our city's problems.

- To develop a long term strategy for replacing vehicles and other expensive equipment in order to provide maximum cost efficiency and service to the community.

Drug Cases

The La Porte County Metro Operations Taskforce investigates drug trafficking within La Porte County and the City of La Porte. Sergeant Kevin Ulam, the taskforce commander reports that a 30% increase in heroin investigations, a 40% increase in methamphetamine investigations and an increase in the amount of marijuana seized in 2013 in comparison to 2012. Cocaine investigations declined sharply, thanks in large part to the arrests of a number of people involved in a cocaine trafficking cell operating in La Porte County as a result of a joint DEA and La Porte County Metro Operations Taskforce investigation. Sergeant Ulam reports the vast majority of heroin coming into La Porte County is still coming from various locations in Chicago, Illinois and there is an ongoing partnership in place with the DEA to address the heroin trafficking problem.

Major Cases

The Detective Bureau arrested two persons for Murder in 2013. The first was Joseph Jemiolo who was arrested for the murder of Kathy Jemiolo. The second subject arrested for murder was Jason Tibbs who was, as a result of joint investigation which also involved the Indiana State Police, arrested for the 1993 murder of Rayna Rison.

Additionally, charges were filed in one rape, three child molestations, nine robberies, nine frauds, six forgeries and five shootings/stabbings. Additionally Chief of Detectives Thate stated that a total of 546 warrants were served by the department as a whole and there were 12 Evidence technician Call Outs.

Closing Points

Citizens need to remember that at any given point in time, there are only four to six police officers patrolling the roughly 150 miles of streets within the 12.2 square miles of jurisdiction of the City of La Porte. So, we are dependent on help from citizens to keep us aware of problems. Any emergency situation should be reported by calling 911. Any nonemergency situations should be reported by calling (219) 362-9446 between 8:00 AM and 9:45 PM weekdays or calling (219) 362-6205 after hours or on weekends or holidays. Please do not assume that because you are aware of a particular situation, that we are aware of it as well. Make that call just to ensure that we know about your concerns. The La Porte County Emergency 911 Communications Center dispatches all La Porte Police Department calls.

Residents are also reminded that in cases of weather emergencies they should not call the 911 Center or the La Porte Police Department seeking information on road conditions etc. The telephone lines of all emergency services should be kept open for emergency calls. Weather and road information should be obtained from weathers apps, radio and television broadcasts and other mass media sources.

A very good resource for La Porte residents that need referrals to available social services, counseling, food, clothing, after school programs, shelter, legal or financial services is United Way 211. We are looking forward to 2014 and beyond and will constantly look for ways to better serve the citizens of the City of La Porte. We are well aware that we are facing some very serious problems in our community and it is going to citizen participation in cooperating with, communicating with and supporting the police for the community to make progress in addressing these problems.
