# **La Porte Police Department 2012 Annual Report Executive Summary**

## ***Department Organization and Information***

### **Value Statement**

Since its formation in 1910, the La Porte Police Department has been providing efficient, cost effective full service law enforcement to the citizens of and visitors to La Porte, Indiana in a manner that is responsive to the ever changing needs of the community.

### **Merit Board**

The La Porte Police Department Merit Board is charged with the responsibility of hiring, promotion and discipline of all sworn officers employed by the department. The Merit Board is composed of three citizens of the City of La Porte. One member is appointed by the Mayor; one member is appointed by the City Council and one member is elected by the officers of the department.

### **Administration**

The La Porte Police Department is headed by the Chief of Police Chief Adam Klimczak took over the leadership of the department on January 1, 2012. The Chief is assisted by Assistant Chief Julie Smith who is charged with many of the day to day duties of running the department. A Community Policing Coordinator, Corporal Karl Jackson, assists the administration with community policing and community outreach programs.

### **Patrol Division**

The Patrol Division consists of 32 uniformed officers and supervisors and is divided into three shifts. Each shift is led by four supervisors that include a Captain, at least one Sergeant and at least one Corporal. The shift supervision is responsible for the day to day operation of each shift. Patrol Division duties consist of responding to all calls for service; enforcing all criminal and traffic laws and municipal ordinances and conducting investigations regarding misdemeanor and lower level felony offenses.

### **Detective Bureau**

The Detective Bureau consists of eight plainclothes officers and supervisors led by a Chief of Detectives and a Corporal. The Detective Bureau leadership is responsible for the day to day operation of the Detective Bureau such as assigning cases and coordinating and directing investigations. The Detective Bureau is charged with conducting investigations of a more serious or complex nature consisting primarily of felony crimes. Two of the detectives are assigned to the La Porte County Metro Operations Task Force.

## **Records Division**

The Records Division is responsible for the maintenance of all records regarding case reports, traffic crash reports and criminal and traffic arrests. The Records Division personnel also process records requests, handgun permits and criminal history checks and take fingerprints for employment and immigration purposes.

## **Information Technology Division**

The La Porte Police Department is highly computerized and very dependent on Information technology for all day to day tasks. We have one network administrator, Charles Smith, who is responsible for maintaining all of the equipment listed below:

- Maintains and oversees 12 servers.
- Maintains and oversees 44 work stations.
- Maintains and oversees 51 laptops, 44 of which are used Mobile Data Terminal laptops.
- Maintains and oversees the wireless connection to the La Porte County Complex as well as full time connectivity to three other departments and IDACS as an additional full time separate connection.
- Oversees two base station radios as well as 50+ Portables and 45 Mobiles including all and FCC licensing and radio programming.
- Maintains and oversees seven printers.
- Maintains/creates all department forms and databases.
- Maintains all stock on radio, computer and printer supplies.
- Oversees/assists 50+ users.
- CISCO Administrator/Liaison with three other agencies.
- Works with the State of Indiana on implementing and configuring all state required programs and forms.
- Recordkeeping of all software licensing and computer equipment documentation.

## ***Data Definitions***

The statistics included in both this summary and the actual data portion of the Annual Report is based on data and all data contains some inconsistencies and inaccuracies. Everything possible has been done to detect and eliminate any inconsistencies and inaccuracies in the data; however some still may exist. It should also be noted that there is some natural fluctuation from to year to be expected in the data in this report and this fluctuation cannot necessarily be tied to a particular cause or causes. And, some categories may have wild fluctuations percentage wise; but are based on such small number of records that the fluctuations are not really significant.

That being said, there are some things that the reader does need to be aware of when looking at the data:

- Accident data is based on the actual traffic crashes that were investigated by the La Porte Police Department. The only exception to the Accident by Age of Driver report which includes all traffic crashes whether they were investigated or not. That is the reason that there were drivers of unknown age included in this report.

- Calls for Service and related data reflect the calls for service as they were initially dispatched or submitted to the 911 Center; not what the calls eventually ended up being.
- Offenses and related data may be thought of as incidents where a case report was actually done. Many of these incidents involved criminal offenses but there were some in which a case report was done to record the incident.
- The DUI: Taskforce Indiana and Operation Pull Over funding is based on the federal fiscal year and reflects money received for activities conducted between October 1, 2011 and September 30, 2012. All other grant money is figured based on calendar year 2012.

## ***Accomplishments in 2012***

### **Projects Completed**

During 2012, the LaPorte Police Department implemented a Facebook page to keep the citizens of La Porte better apprised of news from their police department as well as what is going in the city. The Wanted Person of the Week section of this page has been instrumental in the capture of a number wanted people in 2012. In only 1 year we have received almost 3500 “likes” from citizens utilizing our page. Getting instant information out to our citizens has continued to strengthen our community relations.

The La Porte Police Department has equipped all of the Patrol Division’s assigned squad cars with Electronic Citation and Warning System (eCWS) units. These units, which are valued at over \$23,000.00, were received at no cost to the department over two years through a grant Indiana Supreme Court Division of the State Administration’s Judicial Technology and Automation Committee.

The La Porte Police Department met Federal Communications Commission narrow band requirements by reprogramming all radios and replacing any radios that were not capable of narrow banding. Our Network Administrator, Charles Smith, did all of the reprogramming of the radios and saved the city approximately \$10,000.00.

The La Porte Police Department also completed the task of updating the emergency contacts of all businesses in the community. This community has hundreds of businesses; so this was a fairly substantial undertaking.

The LaPorte Police Department reconfigured the phone system to allow citizens to quickly speak with an officer when they call during normal business hours. Instead of dealing with a tedious automated system citizens calls are answer by an officer who can help direct their call.

### **Projects in Progress**

The La Porte Police Department, along with other emergency services in La Porte County, is working implementing a new computer aided dispatch (CAD) and records management system. It is anticipated that this system will go online sometime during the first of half 2013. From the standpoint of the La Porte Police Department, this system

will provide greatly enhanced crime mapping and analysis capabilities as well as the ability for us to store case reports digitally rather than keeping hard copies of everything.

The financial constraints that the City of La Porte has been forced to operate under have continued to be extremely challenging in terms of the department being able to upgrade, or even maintain its equipment. However, there has been very little reduction in police services to the citizens of La Porte so far. The department administration has been constantly looking for ways to operate more efficiently and ways to improve the administration and processes of the police department to ensure that the best possible service is given to the citizens of the City of La Porte.

The La Porte Police Department is in the process of attempting to improve the quality of life for the citizens of La Porte through the application of community policing principles and in particular the broken windows theory of policing. More strictly enforcing the various municipal ordinances, and in some cases state law, has improved a neighborhood on the near east side of the city and we are hoping to, over time, improve the quality of life throughout the whole city. Late in 2012 a full time Community Policing Coordinator, Corporal Karl Jackson, was named and will be working hard to implement this strategy community wide.

### **Purchases made to improve quality/service**

- The LaPorte Police Department was able to purchase 5 new mobile radios to replace outdated models that were beginning to fail.
- The LaPorte City Police Department was able to upgrade all of their computers to Windows 2010 allowing for a better functioning work environment.
- The LaPorte City Police Department was able to replace their report room printer which is responsible for running 1000's of copies a year.

### **Cost Saving Efforts**

- The La Porte Police Department currently has eight certified instructors: two of which are classified as senior instructors. Six instructors are certified to teach in the psycho-motor skill areas of firearms, physical tactics and emergency vehicle operations, respectively. This enables the department to provide in-house training in these three critical function areas, keeping costs at a minimum.
- A number of cost cutting measures were implemented last year in order to cut down on energy use including the use of higher efficiency light bulbs and the reduction of lighting in some areas where it is possible to do so.
- Steps have been taken to reduce paper use in the department, both to cut costs and to be more environmentally conscious.
  - The Records Division has stopped keeping Accident Cards for people involved in traffic crashes. These index cards were deemed to be redundant and unnecessary since two databases are available to do the same thing.
  - The Records Division will no longer be keeping hard copies of vehicle Crash Reports on file. When someone comes in and requests a copy of a Crash Report; the report will be retrieved via the Internet from

the server where it is stored. This will save the file storage space and labor associated with manually filing hard copies of these reports.

- It is anticipated that when the new InterAct CAD/RMS system goes live, we may be able to eliminate keeping hard copies of Case Reports on file as well and retrieve them on as needed basis only as well.
- Equipment is repaired when possible, instead of merely being replaced as many police departments do.
- We have done away with some costly yearly printed periodicals that were antiquated in their content, due to the advent of the Internet.
- We combined cell phone plans between all divisions which resulted in new phone and a \$1000 a year savings.
- Removed an unneeded water softener that resulted in saving over \$500 a year in salt costs.
- Purchased Training Tracking software that allows us to keep track of all of our training, training needs, and training costs. Allowing us to more accurately and wisely track our training and training funds.

## **Use of Federal Grant Money**

During 2012 the La Porte Police Department received a considerable amount of federal grant money and participated in a number of federally funded programs as listed below:

- The La Porte Police Department received \$116,321.50 in federal funding as result of its participation in the 2009 COPS Hiring Rehiring Program grant. The funds from this grant are paying the salary and benefits of two officers for three years. The total amount of this grant is \$382,154.00. One of the officers hired as a result of this grant is assigned as a narcotics detective to the La Porte County Metro Operations Taskforce while the other is assigned to the Uniform Division.
- The La Porte Police also purchased three new squad cars were purchased with Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) grant money and put into service. The amount of the grant for these vehicles was \$65,175.60. Over the past three years, funding from this grant has purchased a total of 14 new squad cars.
- The La Porte Police Department will continue to participate in Operation Pull Over and DUI: Taskforce Indiana programs which brought in \$45,485.59 in additional overtime money into the department for traffic safety patrols.
- The La Porte Police Department also purchased fifteen bulletproof vests. Half the cost of these vests, which totaled \$8,400.00, was paid for by a Bulletproof Vest partnership grant. The La Porte Police Department is continuing to participate in the Bulletproof Vest Partnership grant in 2013.
- In August & September, 2012, our department evidence technician received a total of 152 hours of instruction in the areas of *Digital Evidence Acquisition & Seized Computer and Evidence Recovery* at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in Glynco, GA. These courses instructed participants in how to forensically acquire & analyze information from a suspect's computer hard drive, (i.e. evidence), in criminal cases ranging from child pornography to financial "white collar" crimes. The training also enabled the department to acquire two

forensic computers, programs, books media and software. The approximate value of the training and equipment acquired is over \$20,000. However, we received it at no cost through the Office of State, Local, Rural, Tribal and Territorial Training. The only expense incurred by the department was for travel. Lodging and meals were also included.

### **Accomplishments of Programs**

- Our Community Policing Initiatives have increased our positive contacts with citizens and has greatly improved our communications with both citizens and business owners.
- Our Metro Unit and our other cooperative drug reduction efforts have helped lead to an increase in drug cases and arrests, and a decrease in overdose related deaths.
- Our Operation Pullover efforts have resulted in getting an increased number of drunk drivers off of our local roadways without spending local dollars.
- Our Reserve Program grew by 50% this year and provided us with 100's of free man-hours for the citizens of LaPorte.
- Our Explorer Program saw an increase in membership this year. These Explorers have helped out several events with traffic and parking lot security and have complemented our other officers working these events.

### **Goals and Objectives**

- We increased police presence in drug depressed areas of the city, by initiating zero tolerance zones for addressing any and all violations.
- To hire enough people to bring the department back to its full authorized strength and to maintain the department at that strength. This goal was achieved on November 26, 2012 when the officer filling our last opening was sworn in.
- To work toward increasing positive police contacts with the public. This has been accomplished with the implementation of a full time Community Policing Coordinator. Officers have also been striving very hard to be involved with the community and with kids in the schools.
- To more effectively address the illegal narcotics trafficking in the City of La Porte. The La Porte County Metro Operations Taskforce has made a considerable number of drug related arrests in the City of La Porte within the past year. The percentages of cases worked by Metro within the city are as follows: Heroin cases 92%; Cocaine cases, 87.5%; Meth cases 66.7%; Prescription Drug cases 76% and Marijuana cases 45%. Patrol officers were also given additional training and demonstrated heightened awareness of the drug problem and the ability to deal with it. Officers have also had great cooperation from the La Porte County Sheriff's Office K-9 units when they request assistance.
- To more effectively address the issue of gangs in the City of La Porte and surrounding area. Gang intelligence has been shared much more openly with other municipal, county, state and federal agencies and disseminated to our officers so that they are more aware of the gang problems.



- To make sure that warrants are served in a timely manner. The department has worked with other agencies during warrant sweeps and has even worked with the U. S. Marshall's Service in an attempt to get more warrants served.
- To address higher than necessary number of traffic crashes and traffic complaints and problems in the city. The number of traffic stops by officers increased 24.44% last year and Operating While Intoxicated Arrests increased 33.51%. Unfortunately, although we saw a slight decline in the property damage crashes; the number of personal injury crashes increased and there was one fatal crash last year. In addition to traffic enforcement; the number of traffic crashes is dependent on a number of uncontrollable factors a couple of which are miles driven and weather conditions.
- To address the need for increased code enforcement to improve the quality of life for the citizens of the City of La Porte. Officers did step up their code enforcement efforts last year and work more closely with the City of La Porte's Code Enforcement Department. Our new Community Policing Coordinator is also working very closely with Code Enforcement and we have seen some successes in some of our rundown neighborhoods.
- That all officers meet their state mandated in-service training hours. This was accomplished again this year at minimal cost to the department. Of special note this year was the Emergency Vehicle Operations Course conducted by certified Emergency Vehicle Operations Instructor Captain Dennis Behenna that officers participated in on the Tire Rack test track in South Bend.
- That all personnel receive training in utilizing the new InterAct CAD/RMS system that was supposed to be implemented in 2012. All personnel were trained in the RMS portion of this system and we are waiting until the CAD goes live before training officers on the CAD.
- All officers receive training regarding dealing with drug trafficking and other important issues affecting the community.
  - In January, three officers attended a two-hour basic drug investigations course presented by La Porte County Metro Operations. This course provided information on the most frequently encountered "street drugs" in La Porte County.
  - In February, two Metro detectives from our department attended the annual Indiana Drug Enforcement Association Conference in Indianapolis, IN. The 3-day conference provided information on national drug updates, national data exchange, profiling and surveillance, search & seizure laws/updates, and drug and trafficking trends. It also affords narcotics investigators the opportunity to network with other area law enforcement agencies to assist with multi-jurisdictional drug enforcement.
  - In March, fifteen officers attended a DUI Sobriety Checkpoint - Standard Field Sobriety Testing Refresher Course in Peru, IN. The course provided officers with the required State approved DUI Sobriety Checkpoint policy and procedures.
  - In April, two Metro detectives attended a two-week basic Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs course in South Bend, IN. This training was presented

- by the National Drug Enforcement Administration and South Bend Regional Academy.
- In April, six officers attended a 3-day Domestic Drug Interdiction Course presented by the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Association (HIDTA) in Hobart, IN. The training outlined programs and techniques utilized to assist officers in developing partnerships with the business community in identifying criminals who use legitimate businesses to facilitate narcotics trafficking.
  - In May, instructors from the Indiana Drug Enforcement Association presented a 7-hour course on Highway Drug Interdiction at the La Porte Police Department. The class was full with fourteen of our officers in attendance, as well as officers from other agencies.
  - In May, three detectives attended the Indiana Drug Conference hosted by Michigan City Police Department. Instructors for the course were from the Multijurisdictional Counterdrug Task Force Training Center, located in St. Petersburg, FL. The three-day course included undercover Operations and Tactical Responses; Use of Drug Informants; and Vehicles Searches and Hidden Compartments.
  - In May, three officers from the patrol division attended “Conducting a Complete Traffic Stop: Officer Safety and Awareness” training in Lafayette, IN. This training focused on the relationship between traffic enforcement and criminal activity.
- That all officers will be recertified in CPR. All officers were recertified in CPR in 2012.
  - That first line supervisor training is provided for the newly promoted Sergeants. This training was held and was open to all supervisors. Classes covering drugs and alcohol and discrimination in the work place were also held.
  - That a Taser Instructor course be provided for whoever is designated to the Taser Instructor. Two new Defensive Tactics Instructors attended Taser Instructor training.
  - That Taser training/retraining is provided for the entire department. All officers were either trained or retrained in the use of the Taser.
  - That a Ground Fighting Instructor Course be provided for the two new Defensive Tactics Instructors. Both new Defensive Tactics Instructors attended a Ground Fighting Instructor Course.
  - That supervision and leadership training be provided for all officers. The Merit Commission’s Promotion School was held and provided such training to all interested officers.
  - That the possibility of implementing some sort of training tracking software to track required recertification dates be explored. This software was purchased and implemented in January, 2013.
  - Enhance the La Porte Police Department’s community policing presence and participation. Officers have made a substantial effort in the past year increase their community policing activities and deal more effectively with the city’s problems. The implementation of a full time Community Policing Coordinator will further enhance our community policing presence going forward.

- Use available technology to further community outreach efforts. The La Porte Police Department has implemented a Facebook page with 3,427 Likes so far. The La Porte Police Department also utilizes Nixle to send out text messages on crime and community information. We have 780 Nixle subscribers so far and the number is continuing to grow weekly. We will also continue to look for other technology related opportunities in the future.

### **Implementation of processes to Streamline Efficiency**

- All Records Policies and Procedures were reviewed and several were updated in an attempt to streamline the records process. Several areas were improved which has resulted in our records being made up to date in a quicker fashion.
- A Records Clerk position was also cross trained to work the desk area on the afternoon shift, helping to allow us to keep the station open to our citizens until 9:45 Monday through Friday.
- Several paperwork procedures were examined for the Patrol Division to allow us to streamline some of our paperwork and allow officers more time on the road.

### **Successes of Joint Efforts with other Government Entities**

- The La Porte Police Department currently has two detectives to the La Porte County Metro Operations Taskforce which investigates narcotics and other serious criminal cases in the City of La Porte. This task force investigated 198 of its own cases in 2012 in addition to helping other departments on many others. This unit has been responsible for many arrest and countless pounds of illegal drugs being taken off of our city streets.
- The La Porte Police Department is also participating in the recently La Porte County Fatal Accident Crash Team (FACT). This team is charged with investigating extremely serious and fatal traffic crashes, particularly alcohol or drug use was involved. The participation of multiple agencies in this team means that additional resources as well as a wider variety of officers with a wider variety of skills can participate in the investigations. This gives our citizens even more expertise when dealing with these tragic events.
- The La Porte Police Department continues to participate in the La Porte County DUI Taskforce which is currently commanded by La Porte County Sheriff's Office Sergeant Derek Allen. Participation in this taskforce makes additional grant money to fund impaired driving patrols available and makes the City of La Porte much safer as a result.
- Several joint ventures with organizations looking to help with the drug issues in our city. We have spent countless hours working with every entity possible to gain as much support and action as we can to fighting illegal drugs in our community. These groups have helped open the eyes of many people in our city and have helped make our job easier by having such a vast network of information.

### **Collaborative Ventures with the Business Community**

The La Porte received generous donations from a number of area businesses that allowed us to have 2,000 dry erase boards with magnets that allow residents to attach

them to their refrigerators for use to write messages etc. These boards, which have the telephone numbers of important emergency services as well as other emergency information printed on them, were distributed at a number of events and also by the businesses that made the donations. We do have a few dry erase boards available at the police station yet.

In December we worked with Bethany Lutheran Church to provide security for their Clint Black Concert. Bethany then donated \$5000 to this department to be used for Drug/Suicide Prevention, allowing us to explore further opportunities for the citizens of our city.

## ***Goals for 2013***

### **Department Objective for the Coming Year**

- To continue and strengthen our efforts in reducing drug use in our city.
- To keep our department at full strength to give our citizens the best protection and service possible.
- To continue to foster a positive relationship with our citizens by increased Community Policing efforts.
- To continue to look for ways to streamline our procedures to allow for the most efficient and effective policing possible.

### **New Department Initiatives**

- Adopt a School Program which will allow us to assign an officer to each elementary school within the city limits.
- New Community Relations/Policing position which will allow officers to spend more time in their patrol areas. This position is geared towards positively advertising our department and making our community a valued part of this department.

### **Improvements to Infrastructure**

- Implement a long term plan for the replacement of Vehicles
- Implement a long term plan for the replacement of Radios
- Implement a long term plan for the replacement of Computer Equipment

## ***Closing Comments***

Citizens need to remember that at any given point in time, there are only four to six police officers patrolling the roughly 150 miles of streets within the 12.2 square jurisdiction of the City of La Porte. So, we are dependent on help from citizens to keep us aware of problems. Any emergency situation should be reported by calling 911. Any non-emergency situations should be reported by calling (219) 362-9446 between 8:00 AM and 9:45 PM weekdays or calling (219) 362-6205 after hours or on weekends or holidays. Please do not assume that because you are aware of a particular situation, that we are

aware of it as well. Make that call just to ensure that we know about your concerns. The La Porte County Emergency 911 Communications Center dispatches all La Porte Police Department calls.

Residents are also reminded that in cases of weather emergencies they should not call the 911 Center or the La Porte Police Department seeking information on road conditions etc. The telephone lines of all emergency services should be kept open for emergency calls. Weather and road information should be obtained from radio and television broadcasts and other mass media sources.

A very good resource for La Porte residents that need referrals to available social services, counseling, food, clothing, after school programs, shelter, legal or financial services is United Way 211. This service can be accessed by dialing 211 from your phone or can be found on the web at <http://www.myuw211.org/>.

We are looking forward to 2013 and beyond and will constantly look for ways to better serve the citizens of the City of La Porte. We are well aware that we are facing some very serious problems in our community and it is going to citizen participation in cooperating with, communicating and supporting the police for the community to make progress in addressing these problems.
