LaPorte Police Department 2008 Annual Report Executive Summary

Our Mission

Since its formation in 1910, the LaPorte Police Department has been providing efficient, cost effective full service law enforcement to the citizens of and visitors to La Porte, Indiana in a manner that is responsive to the ever changing needs of the community.

Department Leadership

Merit Board

The LaPorte Police Department Merit Board is charged with the responsibility of hiring, promotion and discipline of all sworn officers employed by the department. The Merit Board is composed of three citizens of the City of LaPorte. One member is appointed by the Mayor; one member is appointed by the City Council and one member is elected by the officers of the department.

Administration

The LaPorte Police Department is headed by Chief of Police Terry Scherer. The Chief is assisted by an Assistant Chief who is charged with many of the day to day duties of running the department. An Administrative Captain manages training and equipment for the department; is involved in serving as the department's public liaison officer with various organizations and spearheading community policing in LaPorte. The Administrative Captain also assists with other duties as assigned by the Chief.

Assistant Chief Tom Heath oversees the general operation of the Patrol Division and Records Division within the LaPorte Police Department. He also oversees all of our extra duty traffic safety initiatives which include Big City/County, DUI: Taskforce Indiana and Fatality Crash Reduction Effort. His assistance is invaluable in helping the Chief of Police compile the necessary statistics for the Annual Report. In addition to these duties, the Assistant Chief has helped in revising and updating the Standard Operating Procedures and General Orders and Special Orders of the LaPorte Police Department that are necessary to keep the department operating in the legal complexities of the 21st Century. He also helps the Chief scrutinize the operations of the police department in order to ensure that it gives the best service possible to the citizens of the City of LaPorte.

Administrative Captain Dennis Behenna reported that officers completed 5604.75 hours of training in 2008. This number includes the six new police officers that attended that Basic Class at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and the LaPorte police Department's Field Training Program. In community matters, our department has representation in the following organizations: LaPorte County TRIAD, LaPorte County Drug Free Partnership, LaPorte County Project LifeSavers, Project SAFE, SHOCAP, 911

Advisory Board, LaPorte Neighborhood Watch Association, LaPorte County Emergency Management Administration and the LaPorte County Juvenile Services Center Advisory Board. This representation helps the LaPorte Police department keep a finger on the pulse of the community and helps us determine how the department might best serve the community.

For high school age youths; the LaPorte Police Department sponsors and operates law enforcement Explorer Post. The Explorer Post is a good activity for teenagers who think they might be interested in law enforcement as a career choice and it participates in community service projects throughout the year such as the Dusk to Dawn Relay sponsored by LaPorte County Save Our Youth (SOY). The liaison to the Explorer Post is Patrol Specialist Joseph Blake.

The LaPorte Police Department's manpower and resources were used to provide security for the Colts Fanfest, Cruise Night, the Fourth of July Parade, the Sunflower Festival and the Santa Parade. Additionally the department had a large scale security presence to provide assistance to United States Secret Service during the visit of former President Bill Clinton during the 2008 Presidential campaign.

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division consists of thirty-one uniformed officers and supervisors and is divided into three shifts. Each shift is led by four supervisors that include a Captain, at least one Sergeant and at least one Corporal. The shift supervision is responsible for the day to day operation of each shift. Both day shift and afternoon shift have a civilian Communications Officer to them to answer phone calls, provide information to citizens and do case reports that are of a more minor nature. Patrol Division duties consist of responding to all calls for service; enforcing all criminal and traffic laws and municipal ordinances; and conducting investigations regarding misdemeanor and lower level felony offenses.

Detective Bureau

The Detective Bureau of six plainclothes officers and supervisors led by a Captain, a Sergeant and a Corporal. The Detective Bureau leadership is responsible for the day to day operation of the Detective Bureau such as assigning cases and coordinating and directing investigations. The Detective Bureau is charged with conducting investigations of a more serious or complex nature consisting primarily of felony crimes.

In 2008, detectives investigated 470 cases which resulted in 158 arrests. There are still 15 cases from the 470 that are open and under investigation. Fortunately there were no homicides in 2008, but the Detective Bureau was busy investigating robberies, including one bank robbery, burglaries, thefts, frauds, one stabbing that included multiple attackers on one victim, rapes and other sex offenses, batteries, mischiefs and several child abuse or neglect cases.

The Detective Bureau, under the command of Chief of Detectives Clyde Crass, solved several high profile cases including multiple cases of vandalism on churches and

schools within our community, one bank robbery that involved an extradition from Florida and the senseless stabbing of a citizen walking the streets of our community to name only a few. The Detective Bureau also worked closely with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, Indiana Excise Police and the Norfolk Southern Police in apprehending a number of suspects in stealing and selling merchandise off of trains.

Records Division

The Records Division is responsible for the maintenance of all records regarding case reports, traffic crash reports and criminal and traffic arrests. The Records Division personnel also process records requests, handgun permits and criminal history checks and take fingerprints for employment purposes.

Information Technology Division

The LaPorte Police Department is highly computerized and very dependent on information technology for all day to day tasks. We have one network administrator, Charles Smith who is responsible for maintaining all of the equipment listed below:

- Maintain and oversee 12 servers.
- Maintain and oversee 44 work stations
- Maintain and oversee 7 laptops
- Maintain and oversee the wireless connection to the LaPorte County Complex as well as full time connectivity to 3 other Departments and IDACS as an additional full time separate connection.
- Will soon be required to maintain and oversee 44 Mobile Data Terminal laptops.
- Oversee 2 base station radios as well as 44 Portables and 45 Mobiles including all FCC licensing and all programming.
- Maintain and oversee 7 printers.
- Maintain/create all department forms and databases.
- Maintain all stock on radio, computer and printer supplies.
- Oversee/assist 50+ users.
- CISCO Administrator/liaison with 3 other agencies.

Traffic

Enforcement

The officers of the Patrol Division handles traffic enforcement duties for the LaPorte Police Department; both as part of their daily duties and when working special traffic enforcement programs such as Big City/County, DUI Taskforce Indiana and Fatality Crash Reduction Effort. Big City/County brings in \$21,805 annually to pay for overtime for additional officers to target passenger restraint violations, impaired driving and aggressive driving. Funding for DUI: Taskforce Indiana funding was \$18,694 in 2008. This money was used to fund overtime for impaired driving enforcement. Fatality Crash Reduction Effort pays for overtime that targets dangerous moving violations that cause serious and fatal crashes and received \$15,000 in federal funding in 2008.

In 2008, officers from the LaPorte Police Department issued 3145 traffic citations and 2905 warnings. Traffic citations increased 8.60% over 2007 with the largest gains being in Passenger Restraint Violations and Stop Sign and Automatic Signal Violations. Passenger Restraint Violations may have increased because of the new seat belt law which now applies to all passengers in all types of motor vehicles. Automatic Signal and Stop Sign Violation citations may have increased because of the increased focus on dangerous violations that come as a result of our participation in Operation Pull Over. A listing of traffic citations issued is provided in the table below.

Crashes

Total traffic crashes declined by 7.62% in 2008 as compared to 2007; with a decline of 6.95% in property damage crashes and a decline of 9.52% in personal injury crashes. There were no fatal crashes in the City of LaPorte in 2008. Less miles were driven by Americans last year which probably contributed somewhat to the decline. Increased traffic enforcement probably also contributed to the decline. Increased seat belt enforcement probably contributed to the higher decline in personal injury crashes. Friday had the highest number of crashes with 19.97% of the total, with Sunday having the fewest crashes with 6.70% of the total.

Calls for Service

The LaPorte Police Department answered 29,991 Calls for Service in 2008, an increase of 4.82%. The Calls for Service reports reflect the number of actions or situations that LaPorte Police Department officers were involved in throughout the year. Calls for Service can be received by phone; by citizens walking into the department; through alarm companies by officers being flagged down by citizens on the street and by officers self-initiating police actions. The table below lists how calls were received during 2008.

Friday is the busiest day of the week for the LaPorte Police Department with 16.48% of the calls answered occurring on that day. Sunday is the slowest day of the week with only 11.77% of the calls being answered on that day. The busiest hour of the day, on average is 10:00 PM to 11:00 PM with 7.37% of the calls answered during that hour; while the slowest hour of the day is 5:00 AM to 6:00 Am with 1.24% of the calls answered.

Offenses

The report regarding Offenses contains statistics regarding criminal offenses and other non-criminal offenses where a case report has been made. Offenses declined 26 offenses in 2008 as compared with 2007; a decrease of 6.70%. We are unsure just why this decline occurred; particularly in light of the fact that Calls for Service increased. This discrepancy may be partially explained by the fact that some of the Calls for Service that saw increases were officer initiated while Calls for Service involving more serious crimes went down in some instances. A few of the Offenses that underwent drastic changes in 2008 are listed below.

- Burglaries increased 15.79% and attempted burglaries increased 120%. This change can possibly be explained by the current recession as well as the increasing drug problem in our community.
- Child Abuse Offenses declined 44.00%, while Child Molesting Offenses increased 200.00% and Child Neglect Offenses increased 56.25%.
- Domestic Problems increased 14.95% in 2008. This might be happening as a result of the deepening recession which is causing many couples to begin to run into financial difficulties.
- Misdemeanor Operating While Intoxicated Offenses declined 20.44% in 2008, while felony Operating While Intoxicated Offenses remained steady in 2008. The decline can perhaps be explained by the increased enforcement over the last few years as well as much more aggressive public awareness campaigns.
- Habitual Traffic Offender Offenses increased 550% in 2008.
- Fraud Offenses increased 24.12%. This has been a problem with many jurisdictions and as one bank official told me, “Why rob a bank? You can make more money with paper or a computer.”
- Mischief to Vehicle Offenses increased as did Graffiti and Mischief to Non-Residential Property. However offenses involving mischief to public and private properties decreased.
- Overdose Offenses increased 100% in 2008. This may be attributable both to the declining economy and rising prescription drug and heroin use in our community.
- Robberies increased more than 100% in 2008. This again is probably the result of the recession and increased drug use in the community. One credit union robbery was definitely as the result of the suspect being addicted to heroin.

- Thefts declined 15.49% overall, although there were increases in some categories.

General State of the Department

Cost Cutting Measures

The LaPorte Police Department already has a number of cost cutting measures in place. A partial list of these cost cutting measures is included below.

- There has been a 90 gallon per month per officer gasoline usage in effect for over two years. The limit was initially set at 80 gallons, but was eventually raised to 90 gallons. For 2008, we did not use our entire budgeted amount for gas, tires and oil. Our department returned \$17,443.13 in unused funds out of our total budget of \$125,000.00
- Great care is taken when deciding which squad cars to repair and how to repair them in the interest of saving money. Vehicle purchases have been deferred.
- Fewer spare parts and supplies are kept on station than in the past in the interests of reducing costs.
- No overtime is paid unless it is absolutely necessary to do so to cover a shift or cover an event where we have been ordered to do so by the Board of Public Works.
- A number of older, inoperable radar units were traded for one laser unit. This laser unit is the most advanced available and would have cost approximately \$1,900.00. The city paid absolutely no money for this unit due to the trade being worked out between this company and our department.
- Bulletproof vests are bought under the state bid, which results in a substantial cost savings over market price. The department has also applied for Bulletproof Vest Partnership grant funds for since the program's inception. This grant routinely pays half the cost of the department's bulletproof vest purchases.
- We will look at buying squad cars under the state bid in attempt to cut expenses.
- A joint Mobile Data Terminal project that is in the implementation stage will save the city over a hundred thousand dollars.
- The salaries, benefits packages, insurance costs, pension costs and equipment and support costs of the four employees (three police officers and one civilian Communications Officer) that the LaPorte police department is currently short result in savings of approximately one quarter of a million dollars per year.
- It was necessary to retire one of our two K-9s, Kaso. We have not replaced Kaso due to our budget constraints.
- The bulletproof tactical vests used by the LaPorte Police Department's Emergency Response Team have expired and are not longer warranted by their manufacturer as being safe to wear. These vests will cost approximately \$1,600 apiece to replace and they are too expensive to be purchased with Bulletproof Vest partnership funds. The decision was made to take the Emergency Response Team out of service rather due to the lack of funding for vests.
- The city has applied for a grant that will allow the department to obtain alternative fuel cars at drastically reduced cost and possibly furnish us with some E85 fuel..

- We have pursued other grant opportunities when available, but have been unable to find any to assist us in the areas we need help.

Manpower Issues

The LaPorte Police Department, with its current strength of 41 officers, is three officers less than its budgeted strength of 44 officers. The department also has one less civilian Communications Officer which requires a sworn officer to work Post Command rather than on the street. It should be noted that the LaPorte Police Department is at the point that if it loses any more manpower; services to the community are going to have to begin to be reduced.

Financial Issues

The City of LaPorte is projected to have a \$1.2 Million budget deficit in fiscal year 2010 due to the property tax restructuring that occurred as a result of Indiana House Bill 1001. The Mayor requested that the LaPorte County Council enact a 0.5% Local Option Income Tax to assist the city in maintaining its emergency services. Of this .5%, according to state law, .25% would have gone toward tax relief and .25% would have been earmarked for emergency services. This bid was unsuccessful, even though it would have been a cheaper alternative for taxpayers than if the city appeals its tax rate with the Department of Local Government Finance, the appeal is approved and the property tax caps are removed. If no additional funding source is found and the city is forced to make cuts in the police department; police services to the community may be cut.

Implemented Changes

The past year has been very busy for the LaPorte Police Department due to the many changes that have been implemented. A partial list of these changes is included below.

- The LaPorte Police Department has instituted an Honor Guard to be utilized at funerals, special ceremonies and other events.
- Many new Standard Operating Procedures have been implemented to ensure uniform and efficient operation of the various units of the department.
- General orders are now published on our computer network so that officers can instantly refer to them.
- A new shoulder patch has been implemented in preparation for the department one hundred year anniversary in 2010.
- The LaPorte Police Department has authorized campaign hats as optional head gear for its officers. We were hoping to convert everyone to campaign hats, but due to the lack of funding were unable to do so.
- Eleven Tasers have been purchased by a grant and issued out to our patrol officers. This is an important piece of law enforcement equipment that has been proven to help protect the public and police officers from situations escalating into a scenario where serious injuries or death occur.
- An investigator from our department was placed into the Metro drug Task Force to help combat drug trafficking in LaPorte.

- A new graphics package has begun to be phased in on some squad cars to present a more pleasing professional appearance to the public. All squad cars owned by the department will eventually have this graphics package.
- The Citizen's Police Academy was brought back and put into action to help better educate our citizens on how their police department operates and how they can better assist their police department.
- Project LifeSavers was entered into by our department and our Administrative Captain was trained as a trainer. He also trained five other officers to operate the Project LifeSaver equipment. This program is a national program that assists in locating and rescuing missing endangered adults.

Future Changes

There are a number of future needs and changes that the LaPorte Police Department will be going through in the coming year. Here is a partial list of those needs and changes.

- The biggest project that will be implemented in the upcoming year is Mobile Data Terminals. These Mobile Data Terminals will allow information that was previously transmitted by voice to be sent through our computer to computers in the squad cars. This will increase the ability of officers to access information while making communications much more secure and confidential.
- We will be working toward getting all of the department's radio equipment in compliance with new Federal Communications Commission regulations requiring radios to be capable of narrow band communications. Our base station and portable radios have already been upgraded. However, we have approximately twenty-five mobile radios, many of which have been in service since the mid 1990's, that still need to be replaced.
- Depending on the financial situation, we will be working toward equipping the rest of our patrol officers with Tasers.
- We are going to look for avenues to cut costs as a result of expected revenue shortfalls. Most cost cuts will also result in cuts in police service to the community. At this time we are in the discussing and planning phase with our Mayor as to where we will be going on this matter.

Conclusions

The LaPorte Police Department, and the City of LaPorte as a whole, faced a lot of challenges in the year 2008. The police department did a very nice job responding to these challenges; although obviously there is always room for improvement. We will continue to look for ways to cut costs while maintaining the same level of service to the community; but we are rapidly approaching a breaking point where maintaining the same level of service will not be possible.
