# **LaPorte Police Department 2009 Annual Report Executive Summary**

## ***Department Organization and Information***

### **Value Statement**

Since its formation in 1910, the LaPorte Police Department has been providing efficient, cost effective full service law enforcement to the citizens of and visitors to La Porte, Indiana in a manner that is responsive to the ever changing needs of the community.

### **Merit Board**

The LaPorte Police Department Merit Board is charged with the responsibility of hiring, promotion and discipline of all sworn officers employed by the department. The Merit Board is composed of three citizens of the City of LaPorte. One member is appointed by the Mayor; one member is appointed by the City Council and one member is elected by the officers of the department.

### **Administration**

The LaPorte Police Department is headed by Chief of Police Terry Scherer. The Chief is assisted by an Assistant Chief who is charged with many of the day to day duties of running the department. An Administrative Captain manages community policing, training and equipment for the department; is involved in serving as the department's public liaison officer with various organizations and spearheading community policing in LaPorte. The Administrative Captain also assists with other duties as assigned by the Chief.

### **Patrol Division**

The Patrol Division consists of thirty-one uniformed officers and supervisors and is divided into three shifts. Each shift is led by four supervisors that include a Captain, at least one Sergeant and at least one Corporal. The shift supervision is responsible for the day to day operation of each shift. Both day shift and afternoon shift have a civilian Communications Officer to them to answer phone calls, provide information to citizens and do case reports that are of a more minor nature. Patrol Division duties consist of responding to all calls for service; enforcing all criminal and traffic laws and municipal ordinances; and conducting investigations regarding misdemeanor and lower level felony offenses.

### **Detective Bureau**

The Detective Bureau of six plainclothes officers and supervisors led by a Captain, a Sergeant and a Corporal. The Detective Bureau leadership is responsible for the day to day operation of the Detective Bureau such as assigning cases and coordinating and directing investigations. The Detective Bureau is charged with conducting investigations of a more serious or complex nature consisting primarily of felony crimes.

## **Records Division**

The Records Division is responsible for the maintenance of all records regarding case reports, traffic crash reports and criminal and traffic arrests. The Records Division personnel also process records requests, handgun permits and criminal history checks and take fingerprints for employment purposes.

## **Information Technology Division**

The LaPorte Police Department is highly computerized and very dependent on Information technology for all day to day tasks. We have one network administrator, Charles Smith who is responsible for maintaining all of the equipment listed below:

- Maintain and oversee 12 servers.
- Maintain and oversee 44 work stations. Maintain and oversee 51 laptops.
- Maintain and oversee the wireless connection to the LaPorte County Complex as well as full time connectivity to 3 other Departments and IDACS as an additional full time separate connection.
- Maintain and oversee 44 Mobile Data Terminal laptops.
- Oversee 2 base station radios as well as 44 Portables and 45 Mobiles including all.
- FCC licensing and all programming.
- Maintain and oversee 7 printers.
- Maintain/create all department forms and databases.
- Maintain all stock on radio, computer and printer supplies.
- Oversee/assist 50+ users.
- CISCO Administrator/liaison with 3 other agencies.
- Works with the State of Indiana on implementing and configuring all state required programs and forms.
- Recordkeeping of all software licensing and computer equipment documentation.

## ***Activity Summary and Accomplishments***

### **Administration**

The financial constraints that the City of LaPorte has been forced to operate under have continued to be extremely challenging in terms of the department being able to upgrade, or even maintain its equipment. However, there has been very little reduction in police services to the citizens of LaPorte so far. The department administration has been constantly looking for ways to operate more efficiently and ways to improve the administration and processes of the police department to ensure that the best possible service is given to the citizens of the City of LaPorte.

Additionally, the administration would like to list the following accomplishments for 2009:

- Received a \$382,154.00 grant through the COPS Hiring Recovery Program to fund two additional police officers for a period of three years.

- Received a \$25,196.00 grant through the Justice Assistance Grant program to fund updated mobile radios, a much needed file servers and possibly some additional Tasers.
- Purchased ten bulletproof vests, for officers that did not currently have department issued vests, to meet new the new state mandate. Half the cost of these vests was paid for by a Bulletproof Vest partnership grant. The LaPorte Police Department is continuing to participate in the Bulletproof Vest Partnership grant in 2010.
- Applied for, but did not receive, two grants under the Justice Assistance Grant that were intended to fund e-citation equipment and camera and security video equipment.
- We will continue to participate in Big City/County, DUI: Taskforce Indiana and Fatality Crash Reduction Effort which bring more than \$60,000.00 in additional overtime money into the department for traffic safety patrols.
- Implemented a new database for tracking evidence that is being taken into the Evidence Room.
- Implemented a new database for tracking Detective bureau case assignments.\
- Continued to improve Standard Operating Procedures for the LaPorte Police Department.
- Provided security and traffic control for the following community events in 2009; Cruise Night, July 4<sup>th</sup> Parade, Sunflower Fair and Santa Parade.

Administrative Captain Julie Smith announced the following accomplishments in terms of community policing and community involvements in 2009:

- Twelve week Citizen's Police Academy class was held once a week from August 24, 2009 until graduation on November 9<sup>th</sup>, 2009. There were ten citizen students. Curriculum covered 22 topics ranging from department organizational structure, community oriented policing, hand-gun safety, visit to the department firearms training range, traffic stops and enforcement, defensive tactics, TASER demonstration, tour of 9-1-1 center.
- Attended monthly meetings for the following community partner agencies; LCC (Drug Free Partnership of LP County; Neighborhood Watch Association; Project SAFE (juvenile probation); TRIAD; and Graduated Sanctions (Circuit Court – juveniles).
- Coordinated several group presentations with officers involving K-9 demonstrations, annual Fire Dept. open house, and youth groups.
- In cooperation with Camp Summit Boat Camp (Indiana Dept. of Corrections) initiated a community graffiti clean-up program in October 2009. This program involves the property owner to furnish clean-up supplies and Camp Summit provides no-cost labor for the project as part of their restorative justice program. To date, Camp Summit has assisted (4) residents with graffiti clean-up including.
- Served as one of three judges for the annual Jaycees Ghost Walk on Trick-or-Treat night 2009.
- Ordered and received three (3) complete sets of Community Oriented Policing and Problem Oriented Policing Guides from the US Department of Justice at no cost. These guides assist with identifying, analyzing and formulating strategies to

address specific community problems such as nuisance bars, speeding, noise, open air-drug markets, gangs, and other criminal and quality of life issues.

- The LaPorte Neighborhood Watch Association was dying out with only 5-6 persons attending. Part of the problem is that they are used to having a speaker from the community every month that may, or may not, have anything to do with crime prevention or reporting. The department's goal is to refocus purpose of Neighborhood Watch which is crime prevention and recognition and reporting of suspicious or criminal activity to police. As of November 2009 (no meeting in December) there were (17) citizen attendees which is a respectable increase.
- Created (4) new crime prevention brochures in-house on the topics of Holiday Safety, Gang Involvement Prevention, Graffiti, and Home Repair Fraud. These were all designed and printed in-house to save money. I also obtained a new brochure rack, *donated* by the Juvenile Services Center, to hold more crime prevention brochures. Prevention materials that had been left in storage are now being made available to the public.
- Also, working with the National Child Safety Council, who will be soliciting funds from the community in order to purchase child safety literature.
- Issued press release in October for graffiti clean-up program and during holiday season about gift card scams.
- The annual department Employee & Citizen Awards program was held during Police Week (May) of 2009 at city hall to recognize those officers, employees and citizens who displayed exemplary actions in the course of their duties or in assistance to their community. (See Capt. Behenna for additional info.)

Administrative Captain Julie Smith announced the following involving selection and training during 2009:

- Administered written exams and physical agility testing to (19) police recruit candidates in October. Candidates were interviewed by the merit commission and back ground investigations were completed by the detective bureau on (6) candidates. Conditional offers of employment were extended to (2) applicants by the merit commission.
- The police department still maintains (6) trained tracking operators for Operation Lifesaver.
- Ordered replacement CS/ OC canisters to replace those about to expire.
- Oversaw the six school crossing guards.
- All officers met their state mandated in-service training hours.
- Made recommendation to administration that it be mandatory that all newly promoted Sergeants must attend first-line supervisory training, and that the six (6) present Sergeants also be sent. Requested and was granted training funds to send all six (6) present Sergeants to First-Line Supervision training which will be held in January 2010.

## **Patrol Division**

- The Patrol Division initiated or answered 31,526 Calls for Service in 2009, an increase of 5.12% over 2008.

- The majority of this increase was accounted for by community policing calls which are officer initiated.
- Burglary calls, Criminal Mischief calls declined 33% and Vehicle Theft calls declined 36%.
- Fridays are the busiest days for the LaPorte Police Department with 21.21% of the calls coming in while Sundays are the slowest with only 12.63% coming in.
- The busiest hour of the day is 10:00 PM to 11:00 PM with 10.47% of the calls coming in while the slowest is 5:00 AM to 6:00 AM 1.28% of the calls coming in.
- Officer initiated calls accounted for 35.71% of the total with calls received by phone following closely with 32.23%.
- Offenses reported to the LaPorte Police Department declined 13.99% in comparison to 2008.
  - Simple Batteries declined 22.08%.
  - Burglaries increased 9.09%.
  - Misdemeanor DUIs increased 39.45%.
  - Graffiti offenses increased 550% to 26 for 2009.
  - Mischief in all areas declined sharply.
  - Vehicle Thefts declined 27.66%.
- Property valued at a total of \$618,891 was stolen and \$41,425 was recovered.
- At total of 1295 male adults and 347 female adults were arrested in 2009.
- A total of 205 male juveniles and 122 female juveniles were arrested in 2009.
- The total number of traffic citations written declined 9.09% in 2009 as compared to 2008.
  - Child Restraint Violation citations increased 100%.
  - Driving While Suspended citations decreased 20.88%.
  - Tobacco Violations increased 133%.
  - Seat Belt citations decreased 17.11%.
  - Speeding citations increased 15.54%.
  - Stop Sign citations decreased 11.11%.
- Parking tickets written increased 2.94%.
- There were 579 property damage crashes and 122 personal injury crashes; decreases of 9.95% and 8.27% respectively.
  - The most dangerous day of the week was Friday with 17.78% of the crashes, while the safest was Sunday with 9.02% of the crashes.
  - The most dangerous hour of the day for crashes was 4:00 PM to 5:00 PM with 10.18% of the crashes, while the safest was 4:00 AM to 5:00 AM with 0.64% of the crashes.
  - The most dangerous intersections were E Lincolnway/Boyd Blvd. with 18 crashes and Lincolnway/Tipton St. with 10 crashes.
- The LaPorte police Department answered 772 alarms in 2009. Of these, 549 were business alarms, 134 were residential alarms, 53 were bank alarms and 36 were alarms at schools.

## Detective Bureau

The Detective Bureau assigned 319 cases for investigation last year. Approximately 104 of these investigations lead to arrests. Of the other cases, 83 were closed because of lack of cooperation from victim, no crime committed, turned over to other agencies, or civil in nature. Approximately 107 cases were listed as pending/inactive because of lack of suspects or leads. The Detective Bureau would like to announce the following additional accomplishments for 2009:

- In terms of major case status (Part 1 Crimes reported to the FBI for inclusion in the Uniform Crime Report), there were 1525 major cases reported. Of these, 416 were cleared by arrest or exceptional circumstances and 60 of the arrest were of juveniles.
- The Best Western Robbery was solved with the assistance of several other police departments. The suspect had robbed a hotel in New Buffalo, Chesterton, LaPorte and Greenfield Indiana.
- There were several Counterfeiting/Fraud cases throughout the year. Four of them in August resulted in warrants being applied for. The suspect passed counterfeit bills at McDonald's, Low Bob's, and both Dollar General's.
- Another fraud was of an ex-roommate that took the victims personal information and obtained credit cards. She later ran up numerous bills and did not pay for them causing the victims credit to be smeared. She was later charged with Forgery.
- Two subjects were arrested upon trying to cash a fraudulent check at one of our local banks.
- There was an abduction/battery case that resulted in the arrest of three individuals. The victim was tricked into a car by his ex-girlfriend to possibly reconcile their differences. While driving away, her two brothers got into the car a couple blocks away, took the victim to a clearing in the Westville area and battered him and left him there. He eventually walked back towards population and make contact with a home. All three family members were charged.
- Fifth/Third bank of LaPorte was robbed. After an investigation was complete, the subject was arrested. Detectives received information that the suspect was attempting to get to Florida and was currently at a hotel in Indianapolis and he was arrested by the Indianapolis Police Department.
- There were thefts throughout the year that were solved by the detective bureau. Some of these thefts were of bank cards that were later used at local businesses.
- The shooting of an elderly male on Boyd Blvd. this year is still under investigation.
- There were many burglaries solved with the assistance of the patrol division. Once such case happened in July with the burglary of a residence. A patrol unit had stopped a subject about 10 minutes after the burglary happened and he had property on him that belonged to the victims. He was subsequently charged with that burglary. The same subject had entered a second residence and but did not take anything. He however was charged with Residential Entry. Patrol officers have also come forward on cases where they think they know who the suspect might be. After an investigation, sometimes the suspects turned out to be the correct individual responsible.

## **Information Technology Division**

- Implemented the LaPorte Police Department's Mobile Data Terminal (MDT) program. Among the tasks that were accomplished to implement this program were:
  - Configured more than 40 laptops to use cellular technology to connect wirelessly to the LaPorte police Department's computer network. This allows officers to run checks on people via computer rather than radio and allows them to do reports in their squads. This project has also greatly increased officers' access to information.
  - Implemented terminal services server to allow officers access to all software application while in their squads.
  - Was a member of the committee that studied the various options for implementing a new CAD/RMS solution.

## **Goals and Objectives**

### **Administration**

- To successfully implement the LaPorte Police Department's five point strategic plan which addresses the following areas.
  - Illegal narcotics trafficking in the City of LaPorte.
  - The need to more effectively the issue of gangs in the City of LaPorte and surrounding area.
  - The need to make that warrants are served in a timely manner.
  - The higher than necessary number of traffic crashes and the traffic complaints and problems in the city.
  - The need for increased code enforcement to improve the quality of life for the citizens of the City of LaPorte.
- Continue to improve the operation of the police department with an eye toward increasing efficiency and effectiveness.\
- Work constructively with the Merit Commission to implement a new system for selecting supervisors that helps the department promote the very best people for the job.

### **Training**

Training goals for 2010:

- All officers meet their state mandated in-service training hours.
- To provide gang training for the department's (7) new gang officers.
- To provide mandatory training for all officers covering meth labs, recognition, hazards, and department SOP.
- To provide training regarding open air market/ street level drug enforcement for patrol officers.
- To provide interview & interrogation training for two new detectives.
- In order to further develop the quality of our officers we will be implementing job rotation/cross training by placing one patrol officer to be assigned to the detective bureau for a 90 day tour of duty with the detective bureau. Only one patrol officer



will be used during the 90 day period but the officers will be utilized from all 3 patrol division shifts.

### **Community Policing**

- Enhance the LaPorte Police Department's community policing presence and participation.
- Further develop the positive changes that have occurred in the Neighborhood Watch Program in the last few months and expand the Neighborhood watch Program.

### **Information Technology**

- Program and install 31 mobile radios, for which funding was obtained through Justice Assistance Grant, to bring the LaPorte Police Department radios into compliance with the Federal Communications Commission's narrow band mandate.
